Questions to ask when you visit a care home



Finding out about homes

This checklist gives you a number of questions that you might want to ask about life in a home. Some of the issues raised are important for everyone, while others reflect personal interests and tastes.

Some questions will be answered by what you observe when you visit, or by what you read in the home's brochure, but other questions you will want to put to members of staff and residents. It may be helpful to visit a home more than once, perhaps at different times of day.

Inspection of homes

Names of homes visited

Homes are inspected by the Care Quality Commission (CQC). You can get copies of inspection reports from the CQC website at www.cqc.org.uk or by phoning 03000 616161.

Qualifications for care home staff

Nursing staff should have a recognised nursing qualification, and you might expect care staff to have, or to be working towards, NVQ2, NVQ3 or NVQ4 in Health and Social Care. Managers should have a management qualification, such as NVQ4 in Leadership and Management for Care, or the Registered Manager's Award. Staff in homes for people with physical or learning disabilities may have NVQ3 in Promoting Independence.

Care for residents with dementia

If you are looking for a care home for someone with dementia, the 'Care' section of the checklist gives specific questions about dementia care, and you may wish to add others of your own. You may also want to adapt other questions in the checklist to take account of the person's specific needs.
